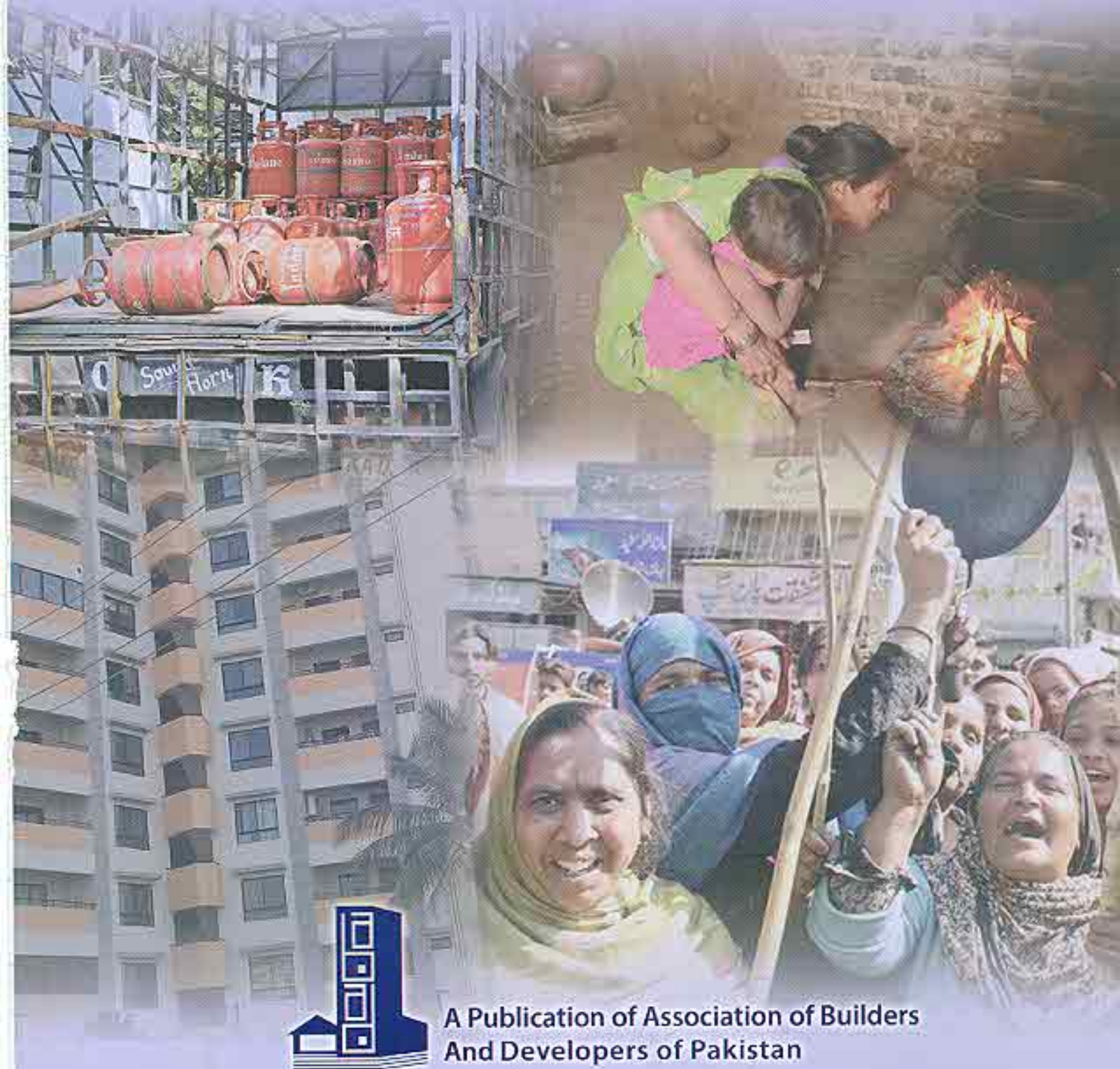

This has also resulted in freezing of more than 200 billion rupees of builders and the public who have booked flats in these projects. It is also causing loss of revenue generation to the Government.

It should clearly understood that provision of infrastructure which include water, sewerage, gas, electricity, roads etc. is the sole responsibility of the state and anywhere when construction is allowed it should be checked in advance that all these facilities should be available in the end runs.

So the problem of gas should be resolved on priority basis to increase the construction activities in the country that in result will be provided job opportunities as well as revenue generation for the Government.

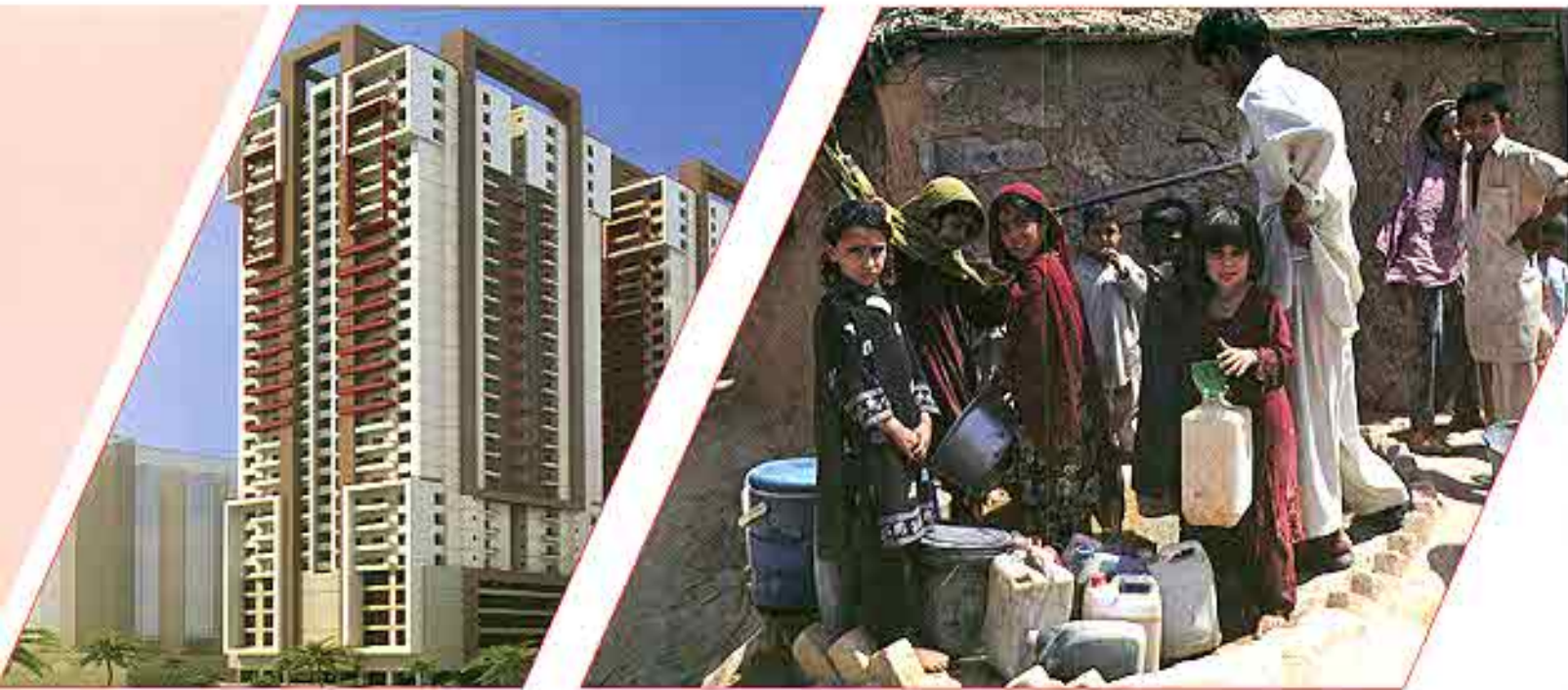

# KARACHI | A CITY OF CHAOTIC DEVELOPMENT

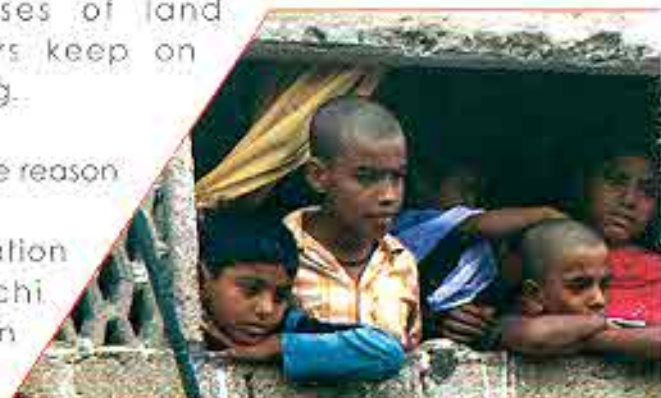
## MASSIVE MIGRATION OF PEOPLE IS THE MAIN CAUSE OF KATCHI ABADIES IN KARACHI

Five of South Asia's mega-cities, Delhi, Mumbai, Kolkata, Dhaka and Karachi, have become the focal point for diverse forms of economic, social and political interaction. Their combined population is 15 per cent of the region's total urban population. Each of these cities performs a vital function with regard to trade, investment, employment, growth and innovation while simultaneously bearing the cost of this function. Not only do these cities face acute challenges in terms of densification, overburdened and unsatisfactory infrastructure, poor urban service provision and a growing slum population, they also pose significant threats to urban life—traffic congestion, environmental pollution, polarization of communities and rampant poverty and violence.

Unplanned and chaotic urban development is

central to understanding such dichotomies. As we all know that Katchi Abadies have also been contributed in the developmental problems of our city and under the prevailing conditions Katchi Abadis are proliferating. Since the "land grabbers" enjoy patronage of powerful peoples and the political parties sooner or later these housing units get electricity and gas connections. After a few years, these Katchi Abadis are regularized and the businesses of land grabbers keep on flourishing.

The prime reason for the proliferation of Katchi Abadis in

mainly due to the lack of basic amenities. The immigrants have formed 'ethnic concentration' which often become serious law and order issue.

However, most flourishing is the business of land grabbers, who even don't spare amenity plots of parks and playgrounds. The 'dignified' land grabbers first construct schools on amenity plots and then convert these into marriage halls. They acquire land in the name of educational institutions on nominal cost from the government but ultimately do the same. So to restrict these unethical activities amenity plots should not be converted into residential or commercial plots.

At present the Karachi city is expanding horizontally. On the National Highway, Karachi touches Ghara and on Super Highway it is getting closer to Thana Bola Khan. But in this case provision of infrastructure is very difficult for the government agencies. So the city should be developed vertically to overcome the issue of infrastructure facilities. Multistory buildings should be constructed on the sites to save the land and make people come closer to the city area rather than go to outskirts for living and earning.

As the city has expanded horizontally and most of

the people living in the far-flung areas belong to middle and low income groups, Most of them have no transport of their own or at the best have motorcycles. Lack of public transport cause two serious problems for commuters:

1) People have to travel in highly depleted and over loaded public transport or

2) Buy motorcycles to save them from this tyranny. Over the years, due to availability of motorcycles at lower prices, commuters have gone for this option. Rising population of motorcycles has given birth to some contentious problems like accidents and worst traffic jams on the roads. huge increase in petrol consumption and the rising pollution caused by the toxic emission by these motorcycles.

As stated earlier ethnic concentrations have developed in various parts of the city, Katchi Abadis have also become hideouts for the outlaws. It is known to all (even the law enforcing agencies) that militants and extremists, robbers, killers and even the most wanted criminals belonging to other parts of the country come to Karachi to for these illegal activities and hideouts.

Planned urbanization can improve outcomes for human development by providing people with the necessities and comforts of urban life. On the flip side, unplanned urbanization can pose the greatest challenge to the survival and wellbeing of urban dwellers and exclude them from sharing the benefits of development, as we have seen in the case of Karachi.



The city's future awaits an informed response from urban planners and policy makers that is in consonance with a rational and environment-friendly approach to infrastructural development. While investing in infrastructure is a costly endeavor and necessitates long term planning, there are several concrete steps that can be taken in the immediate to short-term. These include:

- Resource mobilization by municipal and provincial authorities to finance basic services;
- Provide basic infrastructure facilities to the public from government;
- City development should be vertical rather than horizontal;
- Access to formal housing credit for low and middle income groups;
- Development of human capital and the expansion of individual capabilities to position Karachi as a globally competitive mega-city with substantial benefits;
- Sustainable urban planning needs to be at the forefront of urban policy making in Karachi, where planning documents are dynamic enough to incorporate real-time adjustments.
- Balance between the core and periphery whereby the expansion of the mega-city does not come at the cost of peripheral development;

- Social and environmental assessments at all stages to ensure effective land-use management;
- Minimal speculation over current and potential land values; and
- Protection of land from encroachment and illegal occupation.

For a city of the size of Karachi, good urban planning can result in real urban transformation. Balancing the negative externalities associated with a spatial concentration of people and economic activities is contingent upon effective mega-city management. More often, the city's problems are caused by the pattern of land-use, the violation of laws and regulations, non-provision of infrastructure facilities and overall urban mismanagement.

To rectify these, the city's administrative apparatus can conduct annual surveys and assess both the quality of urbanization and its scale. Moreover, it can document the contribution of the informal sector, which plays a central role in the city's growth and function.

# Visit of CEO TDAP and Delegation from FPCCI at ABAD

A luncheon meeting in honour of the newly elected office bearers



of Federation of Pakistan Chambers of Commerce & Industry was held at ABAD House on 5th March. Leading Businessman and Chairman Trade Development Authority of Pakistan, S M Munir was also invited in it with other Officials from different trade bodies.

The proceedings started with the welcome note of Vice-Chairman ABAD Muhammad Hanif Memon. He first greeted the guests and then briefed them about the agenda of the meeting. The summary about lifting the ban on gas connections has been

sitting in the Prime Minister's office for the last six months. He said that Rs 200 Billion of builders and allottees are blocked at present which could bring more revenue for the Government if brought into circulation.

**S. M. Munir** said that Construction industry has an important role in



the economic development of any country. He said that in his next meeting with the Prime Minister Mian Muhammad Nawaz Sharif, he will take ABAD representatives along and request the PM to remove the four year old ban on new gas connections.

Praising the efforts of ABAD he said that ABAD has great respect in trade associations and this is officially accepted. He said that old issues of housing & construction industry will be resolved from FPCCI platform. Informing about the benefits of EXPO he added that their exhibition was a great success and export orders worth 1.75 billion dollars were booked while the participation by businessmen from 75 countries improved the image of Pakistan in the world.

Addressing the gathering President of FPCCI **Mian Muhammad Adrees** said that FPCCI has declared 2015 as the Year of Revival of Pak Economy and the Government has also supported our view that issues can be resolved at 7% growth of the economy. Appreciating

The meeting started with a brief introduction of ABAD given by Regional Chairman. Then expressing his views regarding the business opportunities in Karachi Mr. Alexey Kudryavtsev, Consultant of Trade Commission of Russia, Karachi branch said that there are vast openings of

He added that the housing mortgage to GDP Ratio in Pakistan is the lowest in the region and Russian companies could start joint ventures in Pakistan.

Vice Chairman M. Hanif Memon said that Russian Tiles, Special Grade Steel Bars, Sanitary Fittings, Fancy Lights and machinery are specially required for high rise construction and can have good scope in Pakistan. So these should also be considered in good business opportunities.

At the end ABAD shield was presented to the guests.
